How the Early Settlers Lived and Worshipped

Enjoy early churches and church architecture in Moore County with historian and educator Milton J. Sills, his presentation sponsored by MCHA, Sunday, Feb. 26, 2 p.m., First Baptist Church, 200 E. New York Ave., Sou. Pines. Admission is free. Please enter from May Street.

Sills is a retired Moore County Schools principal and volunteer and member of MCHA's Board of Trustees. Member of the Southern Pines Historic District Commission, lecturer on NC and Civil War history, Sills is a Qualified Preaching Elder in the Coastal Carolina Presbytery, a member of Brownson Memorial Presbyterian, Sons of the Revolution in North Carolina and of the St. Andrews Society. Charter member of the Kiwanis of the Pines, Sills has served on the boards of the Arts Council of Moore County, the Sandhills Horticulture Society and the Pauley Lecture Series.

Sills has a B.S. degree from Barton College, a M.A. degree from East Carolina University, a Certificate of Graduate Study from the UNC-Chapel Hill and the Principals' Executive Program from the Institute of Government.

Sills is married to Moore County Schools retired music educator Elaine M. Sills, also a volunteer in various arts and community organizations.

Friends of the Bryant House host the 7th annual Clenny Creek Day Saturday, April 21, 10-5, the Bryant House and McLendon Cabin, both at 3361 Mt. Carmel Road in Carthage. Free admission. In case of rain, the event moves to Sunday, April 22, noon to 5.

baked goods, all kinds of other items that people visiting the Fair are accustomed to. In the past jewelry, heritage tomato and other plants, baked goods, carved furniture, toys, and other displays have attracted visitors to the fair, their children entertained by various games organized by the Clenny Creek Day Committee. People in costume as historical figures will be on hand.

MCHA owns the two houses, the McLendon Cabin, occupied during the American Revolution and the Civil War, the Bryant House during the Civil War. The Bryant House was built in the 1820s. The adjacent McLendon Cabin, built in the 1760s, is the oldest Moore County dwelling on its original site. Money raised by Clenny Creek Day helps defray maintenance and restoration costs for the aged dwellings, most recently of the McLendon Cabin's chimney and foundation. A chimney restoration at the Bryant House is expected to be completed this Spring.

Spring History Tour to Eastern North Carolina

April 24 to 25, 2012

Bath, the oldest town in NC (1705) is a stop on the Spring Tour and includes the Palmer-Marsh House (1751) as well as the oldest church in NC, St. Thomas Episcopal (1734). On Lake Phelps is a 14-room pre-Civil War plantation house (1830). At the peak of plantation life, Somerset had 100,000 acres and produced rice, wheat and corn. Antebellum plantation life and African-American customs and traditions are highlighted. Near Washington, NC we visit the NC Estuarium. Through exhibits, art work, films and aquariums, we learn what happens where fresh water meets salt. A pontoon boat tour on the Tar-Pamlico is an option. At Waynesborough Historical Village we may slip back to the 19th Century and visit ten buildings that comprised this faded town. We tour a family home, Quaker Meeting House, medical and law offices and more, including watching a blacksmith work.
